

Fellow FORG Member and renowned speaker, Melinde Lutz Byrne will present our next FORG Family Reunion Meeting, "All my Hero's Came Home."

Melinde has been a genealogist since 1976. Trained as an anthropologist and archivist, she began publishing in 1979. She was elected one of the fifty Fellows of the American Society of Genealogists in 1993 (<u>www.fasg.org</u>) and was its President. In 1984 she joined a four-member team to conduct forensic genealogical research. In 1992 she worked



with geneticists compiling umbilical mtDNA lineages. In 1995 Melinde joined a five-year publishing project to produce The Great Migration Begins and subsequent The Great Migration volumes. Recent publications have appeared in the Hofstra Law Review (habeas corpus) and



GARBAGE ON THE FLOOR? NO!

It caught my attention. I didn't know where it came from, but I picked the small bit of paper up off the office floor to take a quick glance before disposing of it. It was very 'yellowed' and I noticed it was an old newspaper clipping with what looked like movie theaters listings in Chicago – Oak Park, Cicero, and Des Plaines among them. I didn't remember *ever* seeing it before that day, January 11th, 2025. Where did it come from?

My husband and I had just "downsized" to a 55+ "Active Senior Community" seven months earlier. Many items were sold, recycled, thrown out, and some that were in bins covered with dust were stacked in a closet in our new place. They were labeled "Genealogy" or "Old photos," to be processed later.

When I saw names on the paper scrap like Bela Lugosi, Fred Astaire, Hedy Lamarr and



Bing Crosby, I knew this was an old piece of paper.

Turning the snippet over, a picture of a young woman was staring back at me but now I saw a handwritten ARROW pointing at the most important twenty words to me on either side of this newspaper clipping: "After 11 years at the Chez Paree, Alfred Gatti is leaving to become executive chef at the new Congress hotel..."

A young immigrant in 1906, Alfredo Gatti (1892-1964) arrived at Ellis Island, New York USA at the age of fourteen years. He is my paternal grandfather from the Piemonte region of Northern Italy. Now, I have visited my cousins there eight times since the

beginning of my climb of the family tree in 1989. It's a beautiful part of the world, full of rolling vineyards, crowned with redtiled roofed homes and a sprinkling of striking church steeples.

The newspaper article contained information, some of which I was very familiar – Grandpa died when I was eight years old and I had always heard stories about both the Chez Paree and the Congress Hotel. But I knew that some of this information was destined to be added to my simple but effective Excel spreadsheet that was a timeline of his life. You see, as I found the census records, the draft registrations, and other dated historic morsels, I would add them to the spreadsheet, then resort by date and month to get a better understanding of the 72 years he lived.

Well, I had the 'occupation' noted with the two workplaces, but I had no date and thus, no accurate "sort." Nothing on either side of this yellowed slip had any dates. What to do? (continued page 6) Garbage on the floor? No! (continued from page 5)

There are always many resources in the world for all of us – the researchers, the certified genealogists, and the casual collectors of family info. One easily within my reach is the Facebook community. Help with translations, immigrations, locations in other nations, occupations are among the plethora of assistance easily



obtained. I went to a favorite of mine, the "<u>Random Acts of Genealogical Kindness -</u> <u>RAOGK USA</u>" Facebook group. I scanned the article, posted that graphic, gave some background information, and my request for the newspaper name and date.

Do we sometimes wear out that 'refresh' icon when we are anxious to get an answer-the updated posts? Well, refresh I did, and it didn't take more than fifty minutes for some brilliant, helpful individual to give me the answer of The Chicago Sun(day Times) 17 June 1945 page 118.

I had a date! If my grandfather worked at the Chez Paree for 11 years that ended in 1945, that meant he began in 1934. I could also fill in that spreadsheet cell that he began working at the "new" Congress Hotel in 1945. The term "new" referred to the reopening for civilian use in 1944 when the US Government sold it back after training U.S. Army during WW II.

You would think that I would be happy enough to get that response but what followed was a rush of posts with additional articles that had proof of Alfred working at hotels and restaurants in South Bend and Indianapolis, Indiana, Grand Rapids, Michigan. There

FAMILY RECIPE SHARING

MODERN MARBLE CAKE

Ingredients:

- 1 3/4 c. sifted flour
- 2 t. baking powder
- 1/2 t. salt
- 1/2 c. shortening

- 1 cup sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 c. milk
- 1 t. vanilla

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cream shortening with sugar until fluffy. Beat eggs and add. Add sifted ingredients and milk alternately. Add vanilla. Divide dough into three parts. Add pink coloring to one and chocolate to another.

Chocolate Part:

- 1 oz. (square) chocolate, melted
- 2 T. milk

1 T. sugar

• 2 T. Butter Mix together

Put each part in loaf pan and swirl slightly with a knife. Bake for 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Cake can also be made plain and add raisins and dates.
